			6. recognize that we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit in the sacrament of Confirmation.

			4. demonstrate an understanding of the Ten Commandments
C. Doctrine/Dogma – The student will:			
			1. know that Jesus suffered and died for our sins.
			2. know that God is merciful and loving.
			3. know that Jesus came to bring forgiveness for everyone.
			4. appreciate the Holy Spirit as helper and guide in making good choices.

			1. understand the Church as a community of worship, witness, and service, which carries on the work and mission of Christ.
			2. explain ways in which the people of God (the Church) help one another to live as disciples of Jesus.

				4. know the four Gospel writers are Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

				1. know the mystery of the Trinity is at the core of our faith.
				2. know that Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is true God and true man.
				3. define the term revelation.
				4. give examples from Scripture of God’s revelation to people through the ages.
				5. explain the meaning of the Communion of Saints.

				1. understand that the Church – one, holy, catholic, and apostolic- is the people of God and is called together by the Holy Spirit.

				4. know that the Pope is the leader of the Roman Catholic Church throughout the world.

				8. learn the sacrament of Reconciliation is a celebration of God's forgiveness which reunites us with God and the Church.
				9. be encouraged to plan and participate in a penance rite or prayer service of reconciliation.
				10. learn the Sacrament of Anointing the Sick celebrates Christ's healing covenant.
				11. know the Sacrament of Matrimony celebrates the grace filled covenant between man and woman.
				12. understand the Sacrament of Holy Orders celebrates the call to serve God through ordained ministry.
